Chasing The Light

A remote Nordic island brimming with legendary volcanoes, glacier-cut fjords, rainbow-laden waterfalls and geysers may sound like the makings of Viking folklore, yet in Iceland's "Land of Fire and Ice," these fantastical, otherworldly scenes are as real as the blue-green auras that dance across the Arctic sky. Experience the natural beauty of this sparsely populated part of the world during an amazing, nine-day, eight-night journey specially timed for the optimal viewing of the *aurora borealis*, otherwise known as the Northern Lights.

From cosmopolitan Reykjavík to the harbor town of Siglufjörður and beyond, discover life in this egalitarian nation known for its small population, high standard of living and penchant for books, humor and fresh air. Explore the UNESCO World Heritage site of Þingvellir — where the North American and Eurasian tectonic plates meet, and where the nation's first open-air assembly was established in 930, lasting until 1798. As your itinerary unfolds, learn about Viking settlers, the herring industry and geothermal energy practices — all while enjoying guided evening excursions where we'll look to the heavens for a light show like no other.

Throughout your exploration, learn about the Northern Lights during an enriching lecture and enjoy a series of guided evening excursions in search of the *aurora borealis*. Look to the skies outside of Reykjavik and in the dark countryside that surrounds Akureyri, just below the Arctic, for one of Earth's greatest light shows.

Ann Carlson is the Shirley Shapiro Professor of Environmental Law and co-directs the Emmett Institute on Climate Change and the Environment. She is a leading scholar of climate change and air pollution law and policy. From 2021 to 2024, Carlson served in the Biden-Harris Administration as Chief Counsel and Acting Administrator of the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration. Under her leadership, the agency developed strong fuel economy standards to cut greenhouse gases from cars and issued numerous vehicle safety standards. Ann has received the UCLA Distinguished Teaching Award, the Eby Award for the Art of Teaching and the Rutter Award for Excellence in Teaching. Carlson is an elected member of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences and a fellow of the American College of Environmental Lawyers.

Elín Björk Jónasdóttir

Iceland native Elín Björk Jónasdóttir is a climate science and policy expert at the Icelandic Ministry for Environment, Energy and Climate. She is a former head of the Icelandic Meteorological Office's (IMO) natural hazard monitoring and weather forecasting department and has considerable experience in land, aviation and marine forecasting. For the past 15 years, she has worked on severe weather events in Iceland as a weather forecaster and coordinator, including volcanic eruptions. Jónasdóttir spent over seven years delivering the evening weather forecast on Icelandic national television and working on numerous science communications projects.

Jónasdóttir also teaches at the University of Iceland Institute of Continuing Education, and lectures on weather, climate and climate change. During her time at the IMO, she oversaw training and recruiting new forecasters and natural hazard specialists.

She earned a bachelor's degree in meteorology from the University of Oklahoma and a master's degree from the University of Oslo. She is working on a second master's in international relations from the University of Iceland.

World of Natural Wonders



The Northern Lights illuminate "dark castle" lava formations at Dimmuborgir

Feast your eyes on the sky in search of the naturally occurring aurora borealis, more commonly known as the Northern Lights. This luminous spectacle is caused when streams of plasma escape the sun's surface and disrupt Earth's magnetic field, resulting in a multi-colored, shimmering night sky above the planet's polar regions. Seek this phenomenon of Mother Nature along with other geological wonders of Iceland, home to 4,500 square miles of glaciers, 30 active volcanic systems, 800 hot springs and more than 10,000 waterfalls.

Depart Home City

Day 1 | October 18

Depart your home city.

Reykjavík, Iceland

Day 2 | October 19

Arrive in Iceland's capital of Reykjavík and enjoy breakfast en route to the world-famous Blue Lagoon, surrounded by the spectacular views of the lava fields. Pack a swimsuit and water shoes in your carry-on if you'd like to take a restorative dip in these mineral-rich waters as your journey begins.

Depart the Blue Lagoon and head to the city center for a visit to Hallgrímskirkja, a monolithic Lutheran church that serves as an ode to modernism and Iceland's unique landscape. Enjoy lunch on your own before checking into the **Hótel Borg**, a newly renovated boutique hotel located just steps from the National Cathedral and the Icelandic Parliament. (B,R)

Reykjavík

Day 3 | October 20

Explore this Nordic nation's most popular city, beginning with a visit to hilltop Perlan (also known as The Pearl) — a museum with a rotating glass dome and 360° views.

After lunch, walk back through time at the National Museum of Iceland where you can trace the nation's history from the Settlement Age, then stroll the old neighborhood where you'll find time-worn lanes adorned with colorful historic houses and charming shops.

Tonight, enjoy your first guided excursion in search of the Northern Lights. (B)

Reykjavík/Golden Circle

Day 4 | October 21

Embark on Iceland's iconic Golden Circle tour and discover the nation's "Big Three," beginning with the scenic lava plains at Pingvellir National Park, a UNESCO World Heritage site

just 30 minutes outside of the city. Continue on to the spectacular "golden waterfall" at Gullfoss Falls.

From there, head to the geothermal region for a tour and lunch at Fridheimar Greenhouse & Stables, a family run geothermal tomato and horse farm. During your tour you will learn more about Icelandic horses and their extraordinary history.

Catch the Strokkur geyser in action as it sprays a fountain of water and steam high into the air. On the road back to Reykjavík, see how Icelanders make the most of geothermal forces during a short visit to Hellisheidi Power Plant. (B,L)

Reykjavík/Akureyri

Day 5 | October 22

Enjoy a scenic drive to Akureyri, the "capital of the north." Stop for lunch at the **Hotel Blönduós** before continuing on your day.

Check into the **Hótel Kea** and visit the Forest Lagoon, located in the Vaðlaskógur forest. Savor a soak in one of the spa's geothermal pools. After dinner on your own this evening, embark on another quest for the Northern Lights. (B,L)

Akureyri/Dimmuborgir/ Mývatn/Namaskarð/ Goðafoss

Day 6 | October 23

Visit Goðafoss, the “waterfall of the gods,” where the wooden idols of Norse mythology were cast into the rushing waters as Icelanders voted to adopt Christianity. Enjoy lunch at the **Fosshotel Mývatn Hotel** and savor the breathtaking scenery of Lake Mývatn and the tiny craters of Skutustadir. See Namaskarð's gurgling sulfur cauldrons and the “dark castle” lava formation of Dimmuborgir. As night falls, prepare for a final outing in search of the *aurora borealis*. (B,L)

Akureyri/Siglufjörður Day 7 | October 24

Embark on an excursion to Siglufjörður, located 28 miles from the Arctic Circle. This picturesque area, tucked between rugged mountains at the tip of the Tröllaskagi peninsula, is the herring fishing capital of the North Atlantic.

Step into Siglufjörður's past as a tiny fishing hub at the Herring Era Museum, featuring a restored salt house and factory. After lunch at the **Siglo Hotel**, you will travel to Hauganes, a small fishing village on the western coast of Eyjafjörður bay. This idyllic region is known for its stunning coastal scenery, whale watching and warm geothermal waters.

You will have the opportunity to take a relaxing soak in the thermal baths before returning to Akureyri. Savor dinner with the group at a local restaurant this evening. (B,L,D)

Akureyri/Hraunfossar/ Reykjavík

Day 8 | October 25

Journey back to Reykjavík, stopping along the way to see the Hraunfossar “lava waterfalls” in Borgarfjörður — distinctively turquoise blue waters that flow over the Hallmundarhraun lava field.

Savor a hardy lunch at the family-run Hraunsnef farmhouse restaurant, which offers an authentic Icelandic farm-to-table experience as part of your day-long excursion.

Upon arrival in Reykjavík, check in to the **Hótel Borg** with the afternoon at leisure to relax or explore the city at your own pace. Tonight, enjoy a Farewell Dinner at a local restaurant. (B,L,D)

Reykjavík/Return to Home City

Day 9 | October 26

Transfer to the airport for your flight back to your home city. (B)
